4. The Athenians acted badly, and then were sailing to Chios and Ephesos.
5. The Athenians were not treating the alliance well.
6. They were there.
7. Pausanias arrived home.
8. And thus he departed.
9. He sailed back home.
10. Truly Theramenes died in this way.
11. On the following day, he sacrificed again.
12. He left for home.
13. Clearly they were hostile to the people.
14. He was sacrificing again.
15. They were returning home.
16. That one, however, acted eagerly.
17. He was near Kyzikos.
18. They fled unjustly, contrary to the law.
19. Afterwards, Alkibiades was waging war also from there.
20. And on the following [day], the Athenians sailed from there towards Kyzikos.
21. For it was very clear.
22. And they attacked the Lakedaimonians eagerly.
23. They treated the Athenian allies badly.
24. They acted improperly toward their enemies.
25. Thasos was is a bad way because of the wars.
26. He was not exiled justly.
27. And the Thirty departed for Eleusis.
28. And always again he was opposed to those men at least.
29. Immediately they sailed in opposite directions.
30. The Athenians from Samos were treating the region badly.
31. And Derkylidas was hostile to Pharnabazos even earlier.
32. Then Hippokrates the Lakedaimonian governor led out the soldiers.
33. And Alkibiades was not immediately afraid of his enemies.
34. The Athenians sailed back again.
35. The people were not ever friendly to those Lakedaimonians.
36. But the people even yet acted unjustly.
37. Therefore Pharnabazos was immediately going to Chalkedon to help.
38. Some were retreating from the gates and, at the same time, were afraid of Tissaphernes.
39. And the strangers were not treated well by the citizens.
40. Democracy was not good for men of old.
41. That man and another were present then.
42. And thus truly the war between the Lakedaimonians and the Eleians took place.

43. On the following day, they entered the region.
44. And then they did these things.
45. Alkibiades did not immediately arrive
46. Alkibiades was immediately leading them home.
47. For even the Hellenes were not speaking very well regarding these things.
48. Lysander then went to help.
49. And the generals were helping immediately.
50. He invaded immediately.
51. And they were continually [always] fighting each day.
52. They stationed sufficient garrisons there, and the crossed back into Ionia.
53. And immediately the Lakedaimonians and Athenians fought a sea battle again, and the Lakedaimonians won.
54. He was crossing back into Asia.
55. And from there he sailed to Perinthos and Selymbria.
56. And from there he sailed away to Rhodes.
57. And Pharnabazos was not immediately going to help Chalkedon.
58. They sailed away again to Aigispotamoi.
59. From there immediately they sailed to Aigispotamoi, opposite Lampsakos.
60. There he was saying these things to them.
61. Then they fled to the Pontos, and later into Athens and became Athenian [citizens].
62. The ones with Lysander were sailing away home, and the ones with Herippidas were present as generals.
63. The Thirty men with Lysander sailed away home.
64. Thus then the soldiers were retreating from there.
65. And the gods were now clearly allied to the generals.
66. Therefore because of these things, he also sent immediately to Lakedaimonian the men from the garrisons, the men from those in the democracy, Androkleidas, and Meletos.
67. The naurarch was doing well regard the other things.
68. The others fled to Sestos, and from there to Byzantion.
69. And the Ephesians set up a trophy there, and another near Koressos.
70. Theramenes sailed in from Makedonia, and at the same time Thrasyboulos sailed in from Thasos.
71. And at the same time Pharnabazos also retreated to Herakleion, the city of the Kalchedonians.
72. And Hermokrates already fled from Syracuse, and his brother Proxenos, too.
73. They remained there on that day. and on the next Alkibiades called an assembly.
74. And even Theramenes was speaking again on this issues.
75. Then the men were doing two contradictory things.
76. Then the Lakedaimonians sent Thibron, the governor, to them.
77. Alkibiades thus took a few of the hoplites, and then led the army against the Bithynians.
78. Even then Pharnabazos choose the truce, and then he crossed in peace into Europe and was arriving at the Chersonesos.
79. And then truly he gave him a home.
80. And at the same time Pharnabazos also retreated.
81. Alkibiades set up a trophy and stayed there a few days, and then sailed to Samos.

83. Afterward, he arrived there.
84. Thereupon, he sailed.
85. For the Bithynians frequently were waging war against him.
86. Then they were calling an assembly.
87. They were in Sellasia, near Lakonia.
88. At that time, the Syracusan generals were exiled from home by the people.
89. The gods now were openly allies to the generals.
90. And truly in this way the Athenian civil strife ended.
91. And frequently the Bithynians were waging war in the land.
92. And the peltasts were easily fleeing from the hoplites.
93. And the Athenians were losing heart.
94. And the navy was losing heart.
95. The Athenians at home were displeased with Alkibiades.
96. Alkibiades then sailed away with difficulty to the Chersonese.
97. They did not do this sufficiently and well.
98. The Lakedaimonians were leaving, disheartened, and the Thebans were pursuing them very insolently.
99. The Thebans were pursuing them vigorously.
100. For this reason, then, they were also eagerly dispatching to Lakedaimonia some of the private citizens along with Kephisophon and Meletos.
101. Klearchos the governor crossed over to the opposite side to see Pharnabazos.
102. That man, however, did the job enthusiastically.
103. And the people were entirely silent.
104. The foreigners were suspicious of the citizens.
105. He sailed easily to Kos and Miletos, and from there to Ephesos, and he remained there.
106. He led out into Mysian Kios, and from there he sailed to the army encampment.
107. And thus they were marching uphill.
108. It was late in the day.
109. The barbarians were withdrawing back.
110. He sent the infantry across to that place, and led the cavalry around to the plain.
111. From there he sailed to Sestos, to [join] the other army.
112. And the gods now openly fought alongside the other men.
113. And Konon took the sails from there.
114. And then he was plundering the land.
115. There was nearly a year's pay for the army.
116. The ephors then appointed Samios who was at that time the naurarch.
117. And thus truly the war between the Lakedaimonians and the Eleians ended.
118. And some fell immediately into the river, while others were fleeing.
119. He fled to Tegea, but he died there from disease.
120. Earlier he conducted the Mysteries of the Athenians by land.
121. Lysander was then silent.
122. For it was already late.

123. He set up sufficient garrisons there in those regions, and then he crossed back again into Ionia.
124. At first they chose Euryptolemos' suggestion.
125. Lysander did not put to sea, and it was late in the day.
126. Lysander immediately signaled.
127. Lysander killed Philokleos first.
128. Then however the barbarians charged out in front.
129. At the same time, terrible things were happening.
130. He gave him gifts without reproach.
131. He was very angry.
132. There also the Athenians fled and about thirty of them died.
133. The peltasts were fleeing here and there.
134. They were opposite Lesbos on the Malean promontory opposite Mytilene.
135. The Corinthians were not following them at all, and the other allies went to war, but not eagerly.
136. For he also hated Tissaphernes, for other reasons and because he was jealous of his generalship.
137. Things in Asia were going well for Tissaphernes, and in Greece no other war ever got in the way.
138. The brothers did not do the other things correctly.
139. And the Corinthians did not wage war eagerly.
140. Afterwards, Pausanias and the other Lakedaimonians justly went to help.
141. From there the army crossed over to Lampsakos.
142. Then he fortified it [a city], and he prepared a custom-house in it, and collected a tithe from the ships coming from the Pontos.
143. From this time, their pay was four obols, but previously it was three.
144. And they killed nearly thirty of the light-armed troops, and chased the others into the theater.
145. He dispersed the army, and he himself went home.
146. About three hundred allied Odrysian peltasts came to him from Seuthos from far away.
147. The barbarians withdrew again, and one of Persians themselves died.
148. The others were fleeing to the mountain, and the Thebans were pursuing them insolently.
149. However the Larisians stopped by night at Ilion.
150. Immediately he was going toward Skepsis and Gergis.
151. And Pharnabazos was not immediately leaving.
152. He was in a bad way because of the war and the famine.
153. They already suffered evils at their hands.
154. But, equally, the council sent the law to the assembly with one vote.
155. Diomedon was fleeing from there with his own [ship] and another.
156. Immediately again he sailed to their own encampment.
